How can we practically apply this exhortation in our small group dynamics? Share ideas for fostering a culture of encouragement and support within your group.
- 5. The sermon emphasizes the importance of grace as the foundation of small group gatherings. How can we intentionally cultivate an environment of grace within our small groups, especially when faced with conflicts or differences among members?
- 6. The concept of accountability within the New Covenant framework emphasizes transformation and mutual encouragement rather than judgment or condemnation.
