Review:

Grace Redeems our Ability to...

- 1) Place others FIRST (vs. 1-9)
 - The Levirate Law
 - The Kinsman-Redeemer Law:
- 2) Walk with <u>INTEGRITY</u> (vs. 10-14)
 - Definition: The kind of person you are when nobody's looking
 - WWJD: Not "What would Jesus Do?" but rather "What WILL Jesus Do?"
- 3) Go the extra MILE (vs. 15-18)
 - "Redeem" = "to buy back"
 - Jesus is the ultimate Kinsman-Redeemer

The Big Idea:

When we truly understand grace, we respond with surrender to the authority of our Kinsman-Redeemer! We allow Him to live His supernatural life in and through us. We receive an outpouring of blessings we ourselves did not earn. And we give it away to others in need.
